


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POINT IN TIME COUNT OVERVIEW

WHAT IS POINT IN TIME COUNT?

The Point-in-Time (PIT) Count is an annual count of people experiencing sheltered and unsheltered homelessness carried out on one night in January. It is Conducted by every community nationwide in the last 10 days of January at least every other year. It is intended to be a “snapshot” of homelessness on this one night in our community.

IMPORTANCE OF PIT COUNT AND WHY WE DO IT

The purpose of PIT Count is to measure and monitor trends and changes in homelessness on local and national levels. On the local level, point-in-time counts help communities plan services and programs to appropriately address local needs, measure progress in decreasing homelessness, and identify strengths and gaps in a community’s current homelessness assistance system. It is also a federal requirement to complete a PIT Count.

WHY DOES PIT COUNT TAKE PLACE DURING THE LAST 10 DAYS IN JANUARY?

Using the same timeframe for every community keeps results consistent across the country. Repeating this window each year also makes it easier to track changes accurately. Doing the PIT Count on a winter night also offers a clearer view of who cannot access emergency shelter or other crisis response assistance. The count is scheduled at the end of the month so people who can only afford short-term lodging earlier in the month are more likely to be included. It is to ensure that people who can only pay for temporary housing for part of the month are generally included in the count. For example, some people can afford to stay in a motel, but only for the first few weeks after receiving their public benefits payment at the beginning of the month.

WHAT IS UNSHELTERED AND SHELTERED HOMELESSNESS?

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development’s (HUD’s) definition of “homeless,” for the purpose of the PIT count, includes two main types of homelessness:

- Unsheltered: Individuals or families whose primary nighttime residence is a public place not meant for human habitation
- Sheltered: Individuals or families residing in a place dedicated to serving people who would otherwise be unsheltered

- Households observed totals represent those who were unhoused but did not participate in the survey.
- The question of circumstances leading to their housing situation was included in this years PIT Count survey and was not added to the Chelan-Douglas survey.
- This year's shift to the Salvation Army from the Lighthouse may have influenced the lower survey numbers.








Age



Circumstances leading to their housing status




Disabling Conditions/Barriers



Sources of household income and benefits










63 people stated they'd be willing to stay at a shelter if there was room; **46** said they would not. Reasons people stated they did not want to go into a shelter included:

When asked about daily substance use






When asked how long they have been in Chelan or Douglas county


When asked where most of their meals came from in the past week




