Initiative Measure No. IP26-645

Initiative Measure No. IP26-645 concerns state and local taxes.

This measure would repeal a 9.9% tax on annual individual income over \$1,000,000; prohibit taxes measured by individual income and taxes on individual income or the receipt of individual income; and define "income." This measure would decrease funding for public K-12 education, higher education (including universities and community colleges), and human services (primarily healthcare).

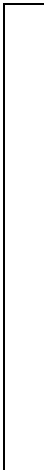

Wenatchee School District No. 246
PROPOSITION NO. 1
BONDS TO REPLACE DETERIORATING WENATCHEE HIGH SCHOOL AND IMPROVE SCHOOL AIR QUALITY DISTRICTWIDE
The Board of Directors of Wenatchee School District No. 246 adopted Resolution No. 03-26, concerning safe, modern facilities to enhance learning and student health/safety. This proposition would authorize the District to: construct a new Wenatchee High School to replace existing classrooms/ portables and expand career/ technical education spaces (adding classrooms to reduce overcrowding, controlled entries for safety/security); upgrade aging HVAC at seven schools for clean air (reducing wildfire smoke) and safe temperatures; issue \$275,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 20 years; and levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. 03-26. PROPOSITION NO. 1
PUBLIC SAFETY AND GOVERNMENT SERVICES LEVY LID LIFT
The City Council for the City of Cashmere has called for a ballot proposition to provide for continual operation of essential government services. If approved, this proposition would increase the City's regular property tax rate to \$1.5737 per \$1,000 of assessed value for collection in 2027, and authorize a maximum levy rate increase of 9% each year from 2028 to 2032. The 2032 levy rate will be used to determine the maximum levy rates under 84.55 RCW.
