A MESSAGE FROM SHERIFF MORRISON

Of the people, for the people

As I reflect back on 2025, I want to thank our citizens, communities, volunteers, and partner agencies who continue to support the Chelan County Sheriff's Office. This past year brought significant challenges to our county, but it also highlighted the resilience of our communities and the dedication of the men and women who serve.

Throughout the summer and into early fall we faced several major wildfires while deputies and staff continued responding to daily calls for service, ongoing search and rescue missions, and the largest and most complex manhunt in county history following the tragic Travis Decker case. That operation lasted from June through September and required an extraordinary coordinated effort between local, state, and federal partners. Despite the complexity and emotional toll, it was navigated successfully through teamwork, professionalism, and the tireless commitment of everyone involved. As the year came to a close, devastating flooding caused by an atmospheric river impacted communities from Stevens Pass and Blewett Pass to Leavenworth, Lake Wenatchee, Holden Village, and Stehekin.

Even during these demanding events, the Sheriff's Office continued investing in preparedness, professionalism, and public safety. Our regional SWAT team continued its modernization efforts with the addition of a new BearCat armored rescue vehicle and the continued development of a regional Crisis Negotiation Team. Training remained a top priority, with our personnel again exceeding state standards, while every first-line supervisor achieved CJTC certification for their position, a first for our agency.

We also continued investing in our people through upgraded equipment, new Taser 10 systems, wellness initiatives, training opportunities, and recruitment efforts. At the same time, community connection remained central to our mission through programs such as Shop with a Cop, National Night Out, youth outreach events, toy drives, and Special Olympics activities. The launch of the BlueBridge Alliance also gave deputies another way to provide immediate assistance to individuals and families facing difficult circumstances.

The agency also continued its efforts of addressing homelessness, nuisance properties, drug activity, and internet crimes against children through proactive enforcement and strong regional partnerships ensuring the quality of life we have all come to expect. Drug operations conducted with our regional partners under the Columbia River Drug Task Force contributed to a reduction in overdose deaths during 2025, while our Behavioral Health Unit expanded to provide near-around-the-clock coverage across both counties.

Investments also continued into updated search and rescue equipment, while our Marine Patrol Unit received statewide recognition for the third consecutive year, this time for life-saving actions. Commitments to our contract cities, schools, the U.S. Forest Service, and Washington State Parks remained strong, while active shooter preparedness and proactive patrol efforts continued throughout the county.

Most importantly, our commitment never changed: to serve all people fairly, professionally, and with dignity while protecting the constitutional rights of every individual. "Of the People. For the People." remains more than our motto it reflects the standard our personnel strive to uphold every day.

Thank you again for the trust and support you place in the Chelan County Sheriff's Office. It remains an honor to serve this county, and we look forward to continuing that service in the year ahead.

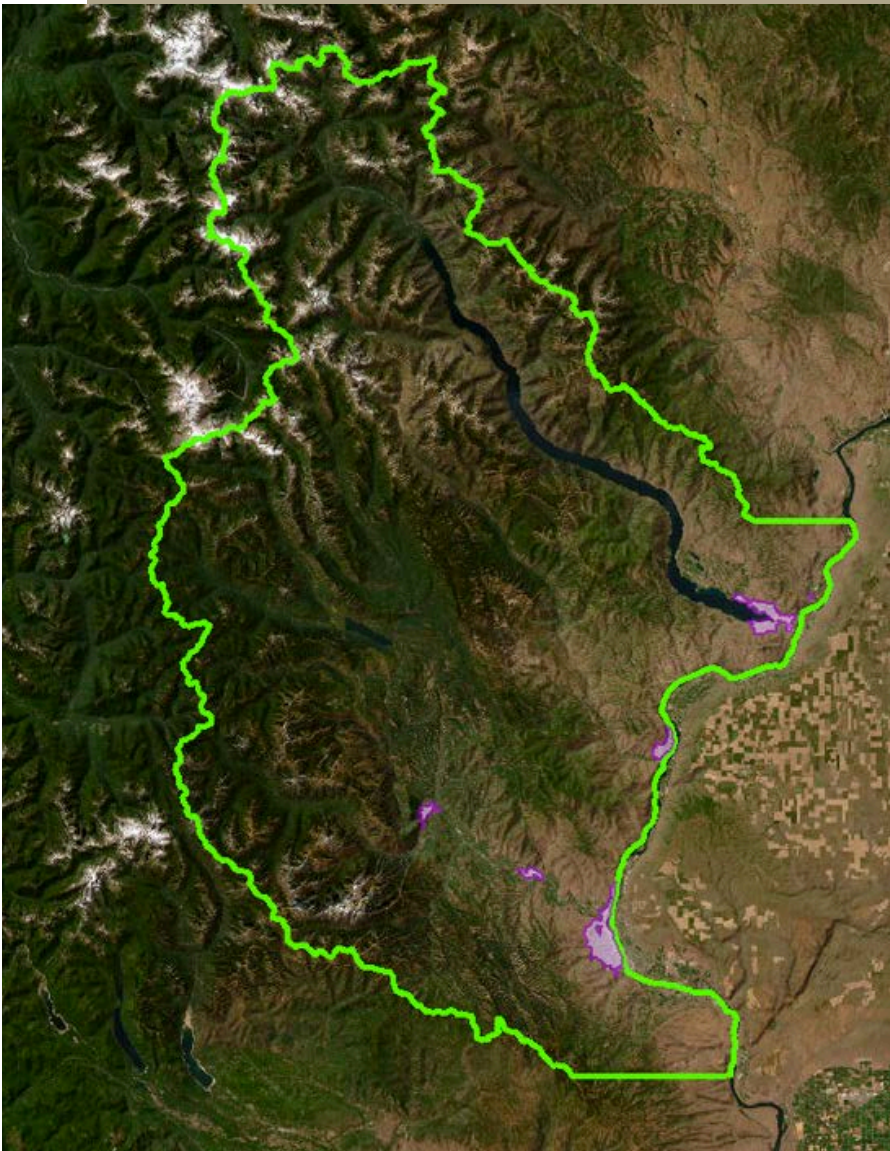

PATROL DIVISION

The Patrol Division plays a vital role in the sheriff's office. Across four squads, it provides 24/7 coverage, 365 days a year, for residents and visitors across the county.

The division is supported by 32 deputies across two-day shift and two-night shift squads. Each squad is led by one corporal and one sergeant.

Duties include responding to emergencies, conducting routine patrols, enforcing traffic laws, and fostering community engagement. The division is committed to continuing training, navigating difficult situations, and fostering community engagement to ensure public safety.

DETECTIVES

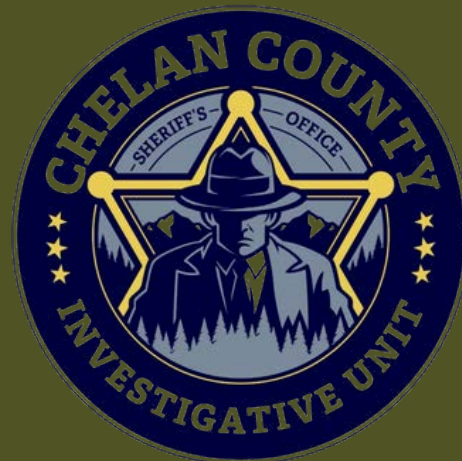
The Chelan County Detective Unit is comprised of an extremely skilled group of detectives who specialize in investigating major felony crimes like homicide, child abuse, fraud and burglary.

Currently our Detectives Division is staffed by four detectives, one Sergeant and overseen by the Chief of Special Operations.

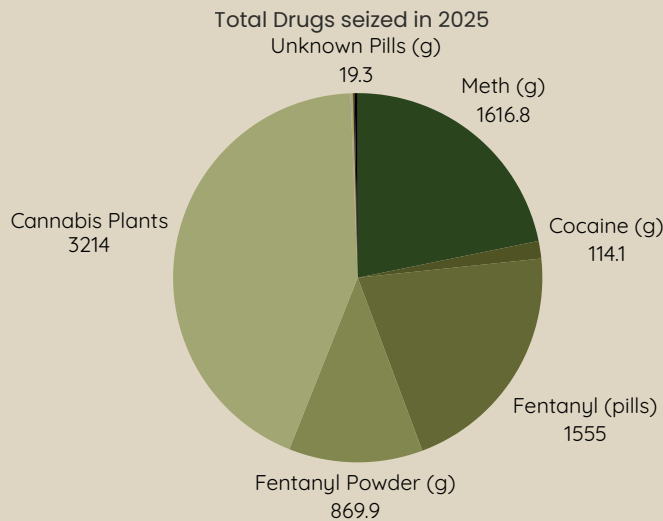

The Columbia River Drug Task Force (CRDTF) is a uniquely interwoven and highly trained team with members from the **Chelan County Sheriff's Office**, Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Wenatchee Police Department, and East Wenatchee Police Department.



In addition to combating the **drug epidemic**, CRDTF assists with major crimes such as **homicides, high-risk arrests, sex trafficking**, and more.

EAST CASCADE SWAT TEAM

The East Cascade SWAT Team is comprised of members from Chelan County Sheriff's Office, Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Wenatchee Police Department, and East Wenatchee Police Department.

The team is made up of specially selected, trained, and equipped law enforcement officers that respond to high-risk situations such as barricaded subjects, suicidal individuals, and other volatile events.

In 2025, the team members from CCSO were Sgt. Lewis, Sgt. Foreman, Deputy Eakle, Deputy Wiggum, Deputy Key, and Deputy Barnes.

CRISIS NEGOTIATION TEAM (CNT)

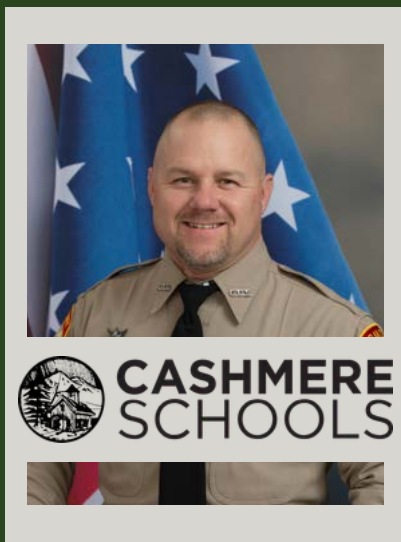

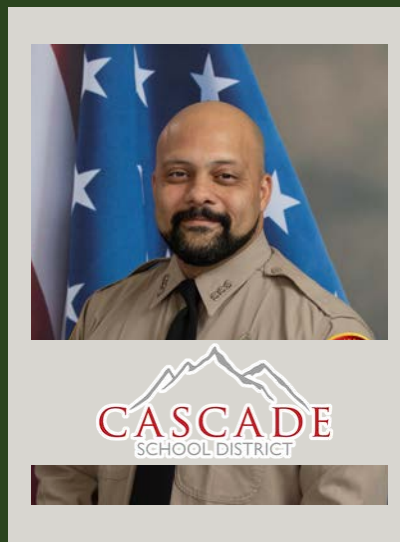
SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

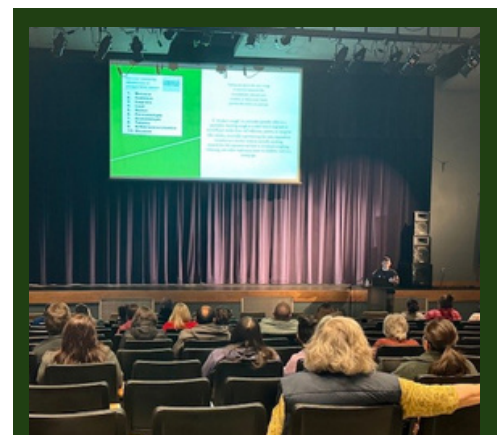

BHU staff are mental health professionals and outreach case managers who **triage, de-escalate,** and **provide social service referrals** based on the need.



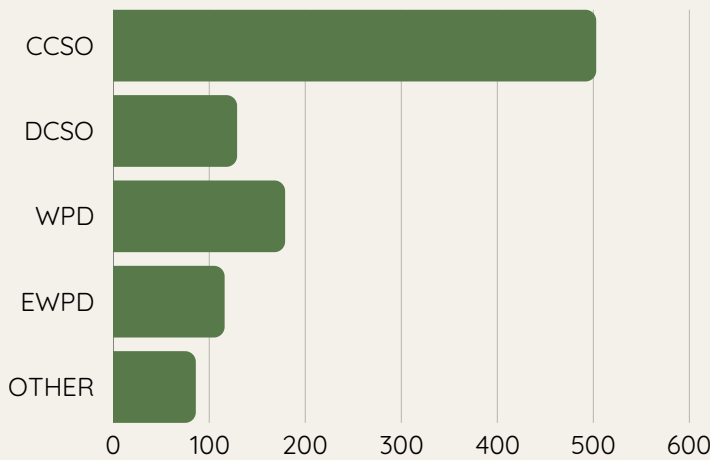
BHU **co-responds** with law enforcement to provide immediate crisis assistance in the field. The team responds to calls with CCSO, DCSO, EWPD, and WPD.

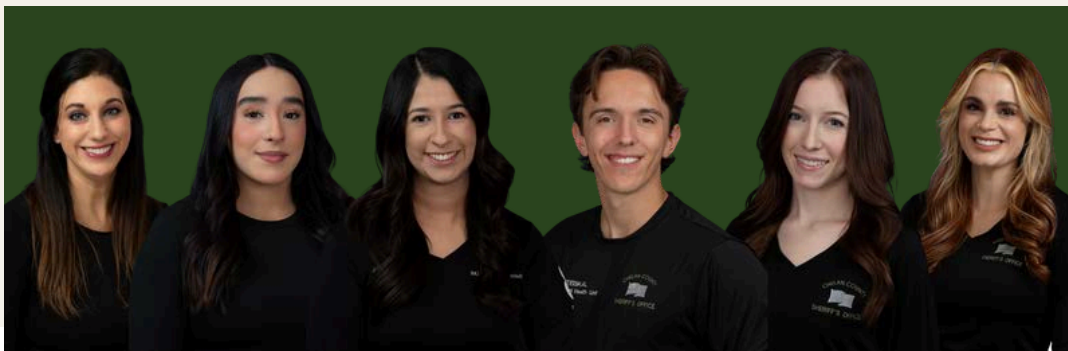

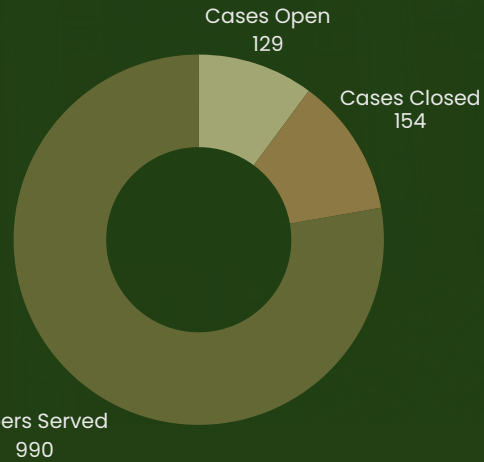


CODE ENFORCEMENT

Code Enforcement’s primary goal is to achieve compliance through voluntary action, education of the County Code, and consistent follow-up. They worked alongside community and county partners and outside agencies to develop new creative strategies to remediate long-standing code violations.



Deputy Wenzel was assigned 2474 Lemaister Ave in North Wenatchee. This property was becoming a nuisance property, attracting drug use, frequent patrol calls, and accumulating large amounts of junk and trash. Deputy Wenzel worked with the property owner. Enforcement ultimately led to the sale and cleanup of this nuisance property.



CAMPUS SECURITY

The Campus Security Team is responsible for the safety of **ALL** county employees and campus visitors each day. They assist in court rooms, building security, and screening of visitors.

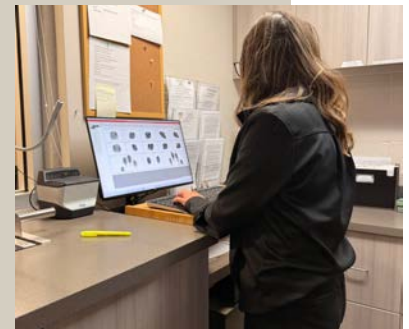

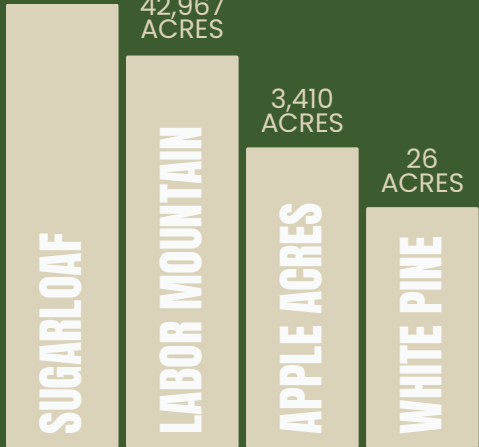

The Forest Service Unit expanded the patrol model to enhance enforcement efforts addressing environmental damage, wildfire risk, illegal dumping, unlawful encampments, and public education on responsible recreation.

CCSO was awarded an additional \$20,000 to support the operations of assigned deputies patrolling U.S. Forest Service (USFS) land within the county. The additional funding was awarded because of the agency's successful implementation of a dual forest service deputy program utilized in 2024, which aimed for 365-day coverage of USFS lands.

FAST FACT: In 2025, there were only **two deputies** assigned to the unit, Deputy Seabright and Deputy McLeod.

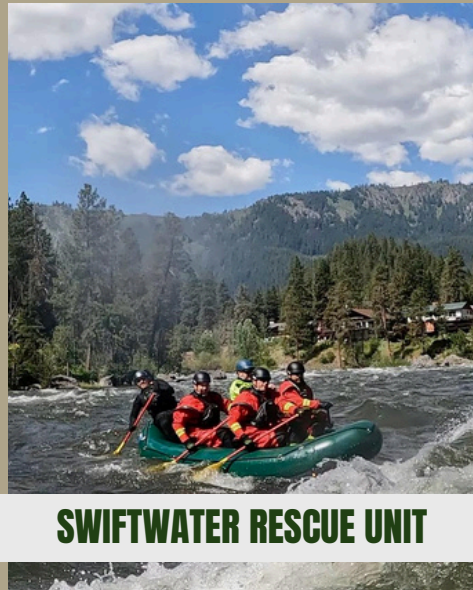


SPECIALTY RESCUE TEAMS

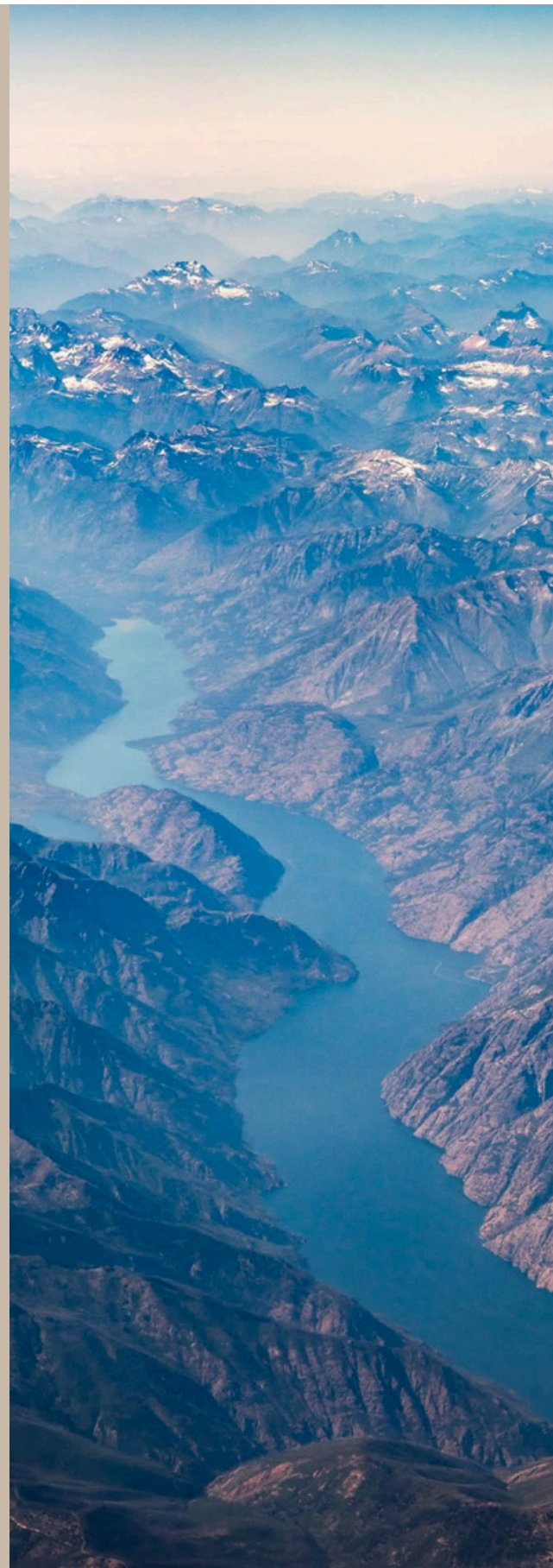

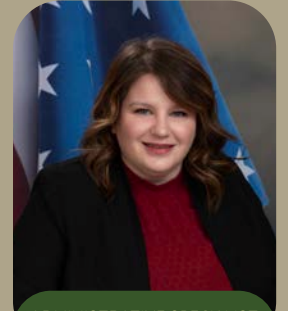

IN MEMORIAM

Remembering K9 Ruben
and his steadfast dedication

K9 Ruben faithfully served his community from 2016 until retirement in September 2025. He assisted in the seizure of approximately 300 pounds of methamphetamine, more than 31,000 fentanyl pills, large quantities of narcotics, firearms, cash, and stolen property connected to criminal activity. Beyond his enforcement work, Ruben was well known for his community outreach and public demonstrations, leaving a lasting impact on countless people throughout his years of service.

Last October, Ruben lost his battle with cancer, which was later recognized as a line-of-duty death due to repetitive exposure to illicit drugs throughout his career. His loyalty, service, and legacy will never be forgotten.



On April 20, 2026, Ruben and his handler, Detective Mark Hegberg, were honored by the Washington State Narcotics Investigators Association with the **2025 President's Award** for their exceptional service to the communities they served.

Additionally, Ruben was honored by the National Police K9 Memorial Service.

Remembering Olivia, Paityn, & Evelyn



The loss of Paityn, Evelyn, and Olivia Decker left a wound on the heart of Wenatchee and all of Chelan County that will never fully heal. Three young lives filled with innocence, laughter, dreams, and endless possibility were taken far too soon, and in their absence an entire community was forever changed. Schools grew quieter, playgrounds felt emptier, and families across the valley held their children a little closer, struggling to understand how such sorrow could touch a place known for its warmth and closeness. Yet the grief did not stop at county lines or even state borders. What began as heartbreak in our community spread across the nation and touched people far beyond it, with many around the world mourning alongside us. The overwhelming response revealed the profound weight of this tragedy and how deeply the loss of innocent children can unite humanity in shared sorrow and compassion. In the face of unimaginable pain, neighbors stood beside one another, strangers became family, vigils glowed with thousands of candles, and hearts everywhere joined in remembrance.


As one saying reminds us, *"There are some who bring a light so great to the world that even after they are gone, the light remains."* Paityn, Evelyn and Olivia became that light a symbol of love, innocence, and the enduring strength of our community which has remained determined to carry their memory forward. Though tragedy rocked our county to its core, it also revealed the depth of humanity that rises in moments of darkness. From heartbreak came unity, from grief came resilience, and from loss came a promise that these precious girls will never be forgotten.
